Dr. Dee Denver, Professor of
Integrative Biology at Oregon State
University commenced his study of
Bodhi trees on Kauai in 2017. Through
DNA testing of leaf samples, similar
genetic code patterns were found in
our temple's Bodhi tree, confirming it
to be a "descendant" of the original
tree that the Buddha sat under in
Bodh Gaya, India over 2500 years ago!
A sapling of the tree was given to the
temple by Mary Mikahala Foster, who
donated her estate that became the
Foster Botanical Garden in Honolulu.
Mary was the "first Native Hawaiian



Buddhist," philanthropist, social activist who supported many native Hawaiian and Buddhist causes in the early 1900's. She was a childhood friend of Queen Liliuokalani. For many years the sapling was kept as a bonsai until it was planted in the ground in 1978 when the "new" temple was built in Hanapepe.



- 1. **Personal safety & protection \$3.00** 2"x2.5" amulet that fits in your wallet or purse.
- 2. **Car safety and protection \$7.00** 2"x 3.5" and can be hung or placed on the dashboard area of your car. "Kauai Zenshuji" tag.
- 3. **House safety and protection \$5.00** 2.75" x 7.5" placed somewhere near the entrance to your front door, in the foyer or even the back of the door itself. "Kauai Zenshuji" tag.
